

## Bus on the Go Improves Transit Convenience

### Riders & Transit Management See Benefits of Bongo

With just a few months since its launch, Coralville Transit's Bus on the Go real-time information system, known as Bongo, is proving beneficial to both riders and transit management.

Coralville, Iowa City, and the University of Iowa Cambus transit departments implemented Bongo beginning in November 2010 in order to make transit riding more efficient, improve passenger safety, and boost the convenience of area transit services.

Bongo makes information such as cur-

rent bus locations and predicted arrival times for buses in all three transit systems available to riders by computer, handheld smart device, text message, or telephone. In addition, LCD monitors are displayed in areas of high transit ridership, such as the University of Iowa Memorial Union and Old Capitol Town Center, with predicted time information so that riders can know where their bus is located and when it will arrive.

Bongo's website, [www.ebongo.org](http://www.ebongo.org), had over one million page views in December, the first full month of operation, with 46% of all website hits coming from a mobile device. During the same time frame, the Bongo phone system, 319.471.4155, received almost 6,500 calls, and SMS visits were calculated at 859 for the month. These numbers may not come as a surprise since Coralville and Iowa City area transit have the highest number of unique rides annually in the state: approximately six million. As of this publication date, the statistics for the Bongo website, phone, and SMS usage for early spring remained steady.

Feedback from Bongo users thus far has favorably reflected the popularity of the system and ease of use. Riders have also responded positively to the benefits of Bongo during times of inclement weather or traffic pattern irregularities, which can alter the arrival of a bus from its standard route

time. By making information easily accessible to riders about their bus location and expected arrival time up to 30 minutes in any conditions, riders are able to minimize time spent waiting for the bus in poor weather conditions or in locations that are poorly lit.

In addition to the convenience given to area riders by making real-time information easily accessible, Bongo also provides free on-board wireless internet access to riders.

Area transit management is already seeing the benefits of Bongo. More inquiries about bus arrivals can be fielded by Bongo's phone option than by individual dispatchers, and data from automatic passenger counters will be used to evaluate current routes and stops.

## How to Use Bongo

Bus stop numbers, available on Bongo signs at each stop and at [www.ebongo.org](http://www.ebongo.org), are used to obtain bus arrival information. To check current bus locations and arrival times of buses expected within the next 30 minutes:

- Visit [www.ebongo.org](http://www.ebongo.org) by computer or a handheld smart device.
- Text 'bongo [bus stop number]' to 41411. You may opt to receive a text message when the bus is approaching the stop, with the lead time chosen by the rider (1 to 10 minutes).
- Call 319.471.4155, enter the bus stop number, and receive anticipated bus arrival time.
- Scan the QR code on a Bongo bus stop sign to load the stop web page on the phone's browser (must have a camera phone equipped with the correct reader application).



## What you need to know about...

# Flashing Yellow Arrow Left Turn Signals

Coralville is one of only a few cities in Iowa to have a new type of turn signal — a flashing yellow arrow — located at the reconstructed intersection at 1st Avenue and 5th Street.

A typical turn lane signal displays red, yellow, and green arrows, and a green ball if the turn movement is permissive (turns allowed when oncoming traffic has a green light). The new left turn lane signals on northbound and southbound 1st Avenue at 5th Street have an additional flashing yellow arrow, as illustrated below.



Steady Red Arrow = Stop.  
No left turns allowed

Steady Yellow Arrow = Prepare to stop

Flashing Yellow Arrow = Left turns allowed, yield to oncoming traffic

Steady Green Arrow = Left turns protected

When the flashing yellow arrow is displayed, drivers may turn left after yielding to oncoming traffic and pedestrians. Drivers must still use caution when turning because oncoming traffic has a green light.

Why did the City choose to install the flashing yellow arrows? Here are three reasons:

1. National studies indicate drivers make fewer mistakes when turning with a flashing yellow arrow than with a green ball. Fewer mistakes mean fewer accidents.
2. The flashing yellow turn arrow gives drivers more opportunities to make a left turn, instead of forcing them to wait for the entire traffic signal to cycle through to another green arrow. More turning opportunities mean less delay for drivers and less congestion at the intersection.
3. The flashing yellow turn arrow provides additional flexibility when programming the traffic signals to handle variations in traffic volumes.

Based on the initial observations at 1st Avenue and 5th Street, residents and visitors will likely see more flashing yellow turn arrows at Coralville intersections in the near future.

## Flashing Yellow Arrow: A Brief History

**Mid-1990s:** Traffic engineers raise concerns regarding effectiveness of the green ball for permissive left turns.

**2003:** Completion of a seven-year national study by the Transportation Research Board; report recommends allowing the flashing yellow arrow as an alternative to the green ball.

**2000 to 2009:** Cities nationwide request and receive special permission from the Federal Highway Administration to install flashing yellow arrows.

**2009:** The 2009 Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices officially includes use of flashing yellow arrow.

## Budget for Fiscal Year Ending June 30, 2012

### Property Tax: No Proposed Increase to City's Property Tax Levy

The proposed City budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2011 and ending June 30, 2012 (FY12), which represents the City's operating plan for the upcoming fiscal year, maintains the current property tax levy rate of \$13.5277 per thousand dollars of taxable valuation. This is the second consecutive year the City's property tax levy rate remained the same.

Property tax is the single largest source of revenue for the City's General Fund. For FY12, the total assessed value for property in Coralville is \$1.864 billion (a decrease of \$4.0 million, or -.17%), while the total taxable value for property in Coralville is \$1.305 billion (an increase of \$24.487 million, or 1.91%). Though the City's proposed property tax levy rate will remain the same, the State-regulated residential rollback rate (the taxable percentage of assessed value) increased by 1.62% to 48.53%. With the rollback increase, for residential property owners the property tax paid to the City will increase \$22 for each \$100,000 of taxable valuation. Commercial property continues to be taxed on 100% of the assessed value.


### Coralville Levies

The proposed tax rate of \$13.5277 is composed of the following levies:

General: \$8.10	Used to support the services of the General Fund as detailed in the General budget; cannot exceed \$8.10.
Tort Liability: \$0.5806	Pays for the costs of City's liability insurance.
Employee Benefits: \$2.7269	Used to pay for certain employer costs of employee benefits including IPERS, FICA, and health insurance. The City levy amount covers approximately 85% of the total eligible employee benefits.
Debt Service: \$2.1202	Used to pay principal and interest on the City's general obligation indebtedness.

### General Fund: Proposed Balanced Budget of \$16,104,261

The General Fund is the City's chief operating fund, and includes revenues from sources that are not required by law to be deposited elsewhere. Property tax makes up 55% of the total General Fund revenues, and the remaining revenues come from hotel/motel tax, cable television franchise fee, utility franchise fee, charges for services, interest, licenses and permits, and transfers from other funds.

The proposed General Fund budget includes the same cost of living increase for both union and non-union employees (1.25% July 1 and 1.25% January 1). The IPERS contribution rate changes from 6.95% to 8.07% for regular IPERS, and to 9.97% for Police and Fire. The proposed General Fund budget has an increase of \$1,114,000 (7%) from the previous year, which includes:

- First year of operation of the Coralville Center for the Performing Arts
- Full year of one Fire Department position and one Building Maintenance position, each added mid-year in FY11
- Increase in staffing budget for Finance Department
- Increase of \$45,000 for contribution to Convention and Visitors Bureau
- Increase of \$7,500 for contribution to Johnson County Historical Museum
- Addition of \$10,000 contribution to UNESCO City of Literature

THE FY12 BUDGET WAS PRESENTED AT THE COUNCIL MEETING ON FEBRUARY 22. THE PUBLIC HEARING FOR THE PROPOSED BUDGET WILL BE HELD ON TUESDAY, MARCH 8 AT 7:00 PM AT CITY HALL WHEN THE BUDGET WILL BE APPROVED. THE BUDGET WAS PREPARED IN CONFORMANCE WITH THE CODE OF IOWA.

The budget proposed for the General Fund maintains a fund balance of approximately \$3.6 million, which is 22% of the budgeted expenditures for FY12. In addition, the General Fund has \$2.0 million in unrestricted reserves for equipment replacement and future capital purchases.

## Special Revenue Fund

The Special Revenue Fund contains proceeds from a specific source which are used for a specific purpose. This includes the Road Use Tax and property tax revenue dedicated to employee benefits. The Road Use Tax revenue is estimated to be \$1,647,286 and supports the following:

## Enterprise Funds

Enterprise Funds are business-type activities that operate similar to a business. Each fund establishes user rates or charges to sustain the current and long-term operation of the utility.

The FY12 budget includes the following rate increase within the Water Fund:

- Monthly minimum rate increase from \$6.50 to \$7.00. The monthly minimum rate is charged to every user for the first 200 cubic foot of consumption.
- Rate increase from \$1.65 to \$1.80 for each 100 cubic foot of consumption per month above the minimum.

There are no rate changes proposed for the other Enterprise Funds which include Sewer, Solid Waste, Storm Water Management, Transit, Parking, and Brown Deer Golf Course.



## Teens' Top Ten Program





## Flood Mitigation Efforts Update



The City of Coralville was fortunate to be awarded three additional grants for continued construction of flood mitigation projects:

- Coralville received an I-JOBS II grant in the amount of \$3,657,090 for construction of earthen berms and permanent and removable flood walls along Clear Creek from Highway 6 to 1st Avenue, and along Biscuit Creek from Clear Creek to north of 5th Street. The Howard R. Green Company is the project consultant. Design work has begun with a June 2011 bid date and project completion scheduled for March 2012. Because the grant award was \$890,000 less than requested, the City hopes to complete the entire project with value engineering efforts and a good bidding climate.
- Coralville received two \$5 million Community Development Block Grants for the construction of two new stormwater pump stations along Clear

Creek, upgrading four existing stormwater pump stations along Clear Creek and the Iowa River, and for associated storm sewer collection system improvements. The Howard R. Green Company is the project consultant. Design work has begun on this project with a July 2011 bid date and project completion scheduled for March 2012.

Design work continues on the CRANDIC Flood Mitigation Project which will provide flood mitigation along the Iowa River from the north end of the Iowa River Power Company parking lot to the Rocky Shore Drive area. A July 2011 bid date is anticipated with project completion anticipated for 2012.

Construction work is nearing completion on all of the existing I-JOBS I and Community Development Block Grant projects. All of these projects are expected to be functional by spring 2011.


# Projects

## Annual Sidewalk Inspections

Because sidewalks that are damaged or in a state of disrepair pose a safety hazard to pedestrians, Coralville Engineering Department staff annually inspects the sidewalks in one of five zones to identify public sidewalks not meeting City standards. Property owners are responsible for maintaining the sidewalks adjacent to their property.

In early April, staff will inspect sidewalks abutting public right-of-ways within Sidewalk Repair Zone 2 (see map) and will mark sidewalks requiring repair. If sidewalk repair is needed, property owners will be notified by certified mail and given 45 days to obtain a permit from the City, perform the work, and have the repair inspected. If the repair is not completed within this timeframe, the property will be placed on an assessment project list to be repaired by a contractor hired by the City. If the repair is done by assessment, the property owner will have the opportunity to pay for the repair before it is applied to the property taxes.

### Does Your Sidewalk Need Repair?

Criteria for identifying sidewalk panels needing to be repaired include:

- Sidewalk panel raised 3/4" or more from an adjacent sidewalk panel.
- A crack 3/4" wide or more in a sidewalk panel or the joint between two panels.
- Sidewalk panel raised or depressed from normal grade by 2" or more within 10' (or less) of sidewalk.
- Sidewalk panel cracked into more than three pieces, with one or more loose pieces.
- Sidewalk panel tilted and ponding water covering half or more of the sidewalk width.
- Sidewalk that has 50% surface deterioration with minimum 1/2" surface depressions.

## Clear Creek Trail Projects

The City of Coralville is currently designing three more segments of the Clear Creek Trail, including a trailhead facility.

**Clear Creek Trail Phase 5 – Part 1** is scheduled to be constructed this summer and will extend the trail 0.3 miles west from the west end of James Street. Included with this project is a trailhead facility to be constructed on the east side of Camp Cardinal Boulevard just north of Clear Creek. Parking, a small water craft launch area, restrooms, shelter, and information kiosk are planned as part of Coralville's first dedicated trailhead.

**Clear Creek Trail Phase 5 – Part 2** is scheduled for construction this fall and will extend

the trail another 0.6 miles west of the Phase 5 – Part 1 project. The trail will stop just short of crossing over Deer Creek. Future segments are being planned that will extend the trail to Creekside Ballpark on 340th Street and ultimately under Interstate 380 to the City of Tiffin.

**Clear Creek Trail – 1st Avenue to Biscuit Creek** is in the preliminary design stage and construction is anticipated in 2012. This project will construct a 10-foot wide trail along the north side of Clear Creek between 1st Avenue and Biscuit Creek, and will provide connections to the trail underpasses at the Highway 6 bridge and the 1st Avenue bridge (to be completed this spring).

## Spring Reminder to Improve Stormwater Quality



### Iowa Native Plant Garden to Take Root at Library

A community initiative has inspired the installation of a perennial garden of native Iowa plants at the Coralville Public Library, scheduled to be planted on Earth Day, April 22. Coralville residents and businesses have the opportunity to help the creeks, streams, and rivers running through our community become a healthier environment. Many day-to-day activities have a negative impact on aquatic habitats. Below are common practices that will minimize stormwater pollution:

- Follow manufacturer recommended application rates when applying fertilizer to yards. Do not rinse equipment on impervious surfaces, near storm sewer inlets, or waterways. Sweep excess materials from driveways and sidewalks onto the yard instead of rinsing or waiting for a rain.
- Do not dump grass clippings in the storm sewer inlets or waterways. Place excess

clippings in yard waste bags or a container with an annual yard waste sticker along the curb for pick up on waste collection day.

- Pick up pet waste. Bacteria from pet waste reduce water quality.
- Wash vehicles at a commercial car wash, grassy area, or drain that connects to the sanitary sewer system. Wash waters carry harmful oils, metals, and other pollutants directly down storm drains.


## Dealing with Yard Waste

Yard waste pickup begins the third week in March, weather permitting. Open burning of yard waste is not allowed in the City.

To properly discard of yard waste:

- Use biodegradable yard waste bags (available for purchase at City Hall, Coralville Hy-Vee, and Leno and Cilek Ace Hardware for \$5 per five bags).
- Use an annual yard waste sticker on a 33-gallon container. Annual yard waste stickers are available for \$25 at City Hall.
- Securely tie brush and tree limbs into bundles of no larger than 2 inches in diameter by 4 feet in length; there is no charge for the pickup.

Never sweep or blow grass clippings into the street, ditches, or drains. Grass clippings, leaves, and other yard debris are pollutants that plug storm sewers, potentially causing flooding.



## Outside the House: Projects & Tips to Stay Within Code

The Building Department offers the following guidelines to stay within code outside your home.

### Permits – Get One!

Permit requirements exist so that repairs and construction are made according to current building codes — something that protects your safety as well as the investment in your home. A building permit application is available at [www.coralville.org/buildingpermit](http://www.coralville.org/buildingpermit) or from the Building Department office.

**Decks:** A building permit is required to build a deck. A completed building permit application, site plan, and drawing or deck plan showing all dimensions (including dimensions for hand railings, stairs, and locations of post holes) are required. The permit fee, which includes all inspections, is based on the project value.

**Roofs and Siding:** A building permit is not necessary to re-side or re-shingle a single family dwelling or duplex as long as no structural damage is to be repaired. But if part of the structure underneath the shingles or siding requires repair or replacement, a building permit is required. All commercial re-roofing and siding require a building permit.

**Sheds:** A building permit is required for sheds greater than 200 square feet; all storage sheds must be located in the rear yard. Contact the Building Department to discuss shed placement to ensure that it meets all requirements.

### Real Estate Signs

A sign can only be placed in the property for sale, and not on the corner of the street. Signs are not allowed in the public right of way, such as the space between the sidewalk and the street, the median, or roundabout.

### Parking

Vehicles cannot be parked in yards. Parking is allowed only on hard surfaces such as a concrete drive leading to a garage or carport. Parked cars should never obstruct the sidewalk, and parking is never allowed between the sidewalk and curb.

## Installing a Fence?

Fence installation requires a fence permit. To apply, complete and submit a fence permit application, available at [www.coralville.org/buildingforms](http://www.coralville.org/buildingforms), and a basic site plan to the Building Department. Fence installation can begin after approval of the permit and payment of the \$23.50 permit fee. Contact Iowa One Call at 1.800.292.8989 or [www.iowaonecall.com](http://www.iowaonecall.com) at least 48 hours prior to digging so that underground facilities can be marked.



## Community Fund Awards 2010 Grants
